News from Spain: Querini is more present than ever in Ría da Estrela

The Muros Noia Fjord, also known as **Ría da Estrela**, has recently experienced a period of great activity.

On June 10, the Museum of Pilgrimages of Santiago de Compostela hosted the presentation in Galicia of the three editions (Galician, English, and Italian) of the book "The Itinerary of the Pilgrimage of Pietro Querini (1431) from Muros to Compostela." This publication, presented in Venice at the end of April, chronicles Pietro Querini's journey, a testimony that has decisively contributed to the study of the historicity of the St. James Way of Muros Noia Fjord. Marcelino Agís, president of the Xacobea Academy, participate in this presentation.

At the same time, work continues on marking the various stages of the Camino also with the signage of Via Querinissima.

Meanwhile, schools in the region are finalizing the "draw your map" competition, an activity that has effectively served to introduce young people to the figure of Querini.

Finally, on the last day of the month, some of sailing vessels will depart from Baiona and sail up the Muros Noia Fjord, following in the footsteps of Pietro Querini. Once they reach the fjord, they will walk to Santiago de Compostela along the same paths he traveled, earning themselves the right to receive "the Compostela", the document certifying that they have completed a Jacobean route.














WHAT HAPPENED IN THE MEANTIME

Meetings in Lisbon

Three key meetings were held in Portugal last week for the development of the Portuguese section of the Via Querinissima itinerary. Pietro Querini, indeed, arrived in Lisbon on 29 August 1431 after a perilous voyage. It was in this city that Querini and his crew worked tirelessly to repair their damaged ship and replenish their supplies and remaining there until 24 September before continuing their journey.

Productive discussions were held with the **Port of Lisbon Authority**, the **Italian Embassy**, and the **Italian Cultural Institute in Lisbon**, laying the groundwork for future initiatives.

In addition, we had the opportunity to visit the **Maritime Museum of the Port of Lisbon**, exploring a fascinating exhibition that retraces the port's modern history from the 1940s to the post-war period.
